We wish to acknowledge this land on which the Alzheimer Society of Hastings-Prince Edward operates. For thousands of years, it has been the traditional land of the Haudenosaunee, Anishinaabeg, Mississauga, Algonquin, and the Huron-Wendat.

Our service area is directly adjacent to Tyendinaga Mohawk Territory, which is home to the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte. Today, this area is still the home to many Indigenous people from across Turtle Island² and we are grateful to have the opportunity to live and work on this land.

In light of this history and understanding our role as Treaty People, may we dedicate ourselves to moving forward in the spirit of partnership, collaboration, and reconciliation, as we learn together and contemplate the possibilities that lay ahead.
