The Alzheimer Society Timmins Porcupine District Inc. was founded by a group of family caregivers in 1988 under the leadership of Monica Bevil. It is a Non-Profit Corporation and registered charity governed by a Board of Directors who are elected at the Annual General Meeting held once a year.

The Society is operated and managed by a team of 9 full time and 1-part time staff who are responsible for the design and implementation of family support, including behavioral specific, as well as education services in both official languages.

We will accomplish this mission by:

Dementia by the numbers

The urgency

- Over 500,000 The number of Canadians living with dementia today.1
- 912,000 The number of Canadians living with dementia in 2030.1
- 76,000 The number of Canadians diagnosed with dementia every year.2
- 65% of those diagnosed with dementia over the age of 65 are women.3
- 1 in 5 Canadians have experience caring for someone living with dementia.4

The costs

- Over \$10.4 billion The annual cost of dementia to the Canadian economy and healthcare system.5
- \$359 million The cost to bring a dementia-treating drug from lab to market.6

The stigma

- 56% of Canadians are concerned about being affected by Alzheimer's disease.4,7
- 46% of Canadians admit they would feel ashamed or embarrassed if that they had dementia.4
- 87% of caregivers wish that more people understood the realities of caring for someone with dementia.4

The progress

- More than \$64 million invested to date in research through the Alzheimer Society Research Program.
- 37,000+ Canadians participated in the 2019 IG Wealth Management Walk for Alzheimer's, raising a record \$6.2 million that will fund programs and services for people living with dementia across Canada.




2021-2022 was another very challenging year ... with more success than the prior year.





Note from Executive Director

This has been a year of change and growth for our organization! Over this past year many hours were spent in partnership with Ontario Health, Canadian Red Cross and The Timmins Golden Manor to work towards the divesting of their Adult Day Programs to our suite of services. Staff were recruited and hired to staff three of our six locations and started at the end of the fiscal year; we opened a five day a week program in Timmins located at the 101 Mall on Pine St N; a five day per week program in Kapuskasing located at 10 Drury St and a one day per week program in Hearst located at the Club Action. The remaining three locations will be opening in June of 2022 in Cochrane, Iroquois Falls and Matheson!

We were also privileged to receive another new base funded program to support families with the transition from home into retirement or long term care. This new program supports families in the Cochrane District as they make this challenging move.

The addition of these two programs will help our staff support families with more direct services.

The corona-virus (Covid-19) is still present and continues to impede face to face services and community based programs in our region. Virtual service delivery has been maintained over the past year with virtual social recreation activities planned and implemented- thanks in part to Michael and Catherine Booth and the Alzheimer Society of Ontario.

Since 1988 our service delivery area has grown to service all of the Cochrane and Temiskaming Districts.

This past year we received approval from the Service Canada to adapt our 'operating as' name to more accurately reflect the areas of service.


