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Independent Auditor's Report

To the Members of Alzheimer Society of Dufferin County

Qualified Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Alzheimer Society of Dufferin County ("the organization"), which comprise the statement of financial position as at March 31, 2021, and the statements of operations, changes in net assets and cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, except for the possible effects of the matter described in the *Basis for Qualified Opinion* section of our report, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the organization as at March 31, 2021, and its results of operations and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

In common with many charitable organizations, the organization derives revenue from donations and other fundraising activities, the completeness of which is not susceptible to satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly, verification of these revenues was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of the organization. Therefore, we were not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to donations and fundraising revenues, excess of revenues over expenses, and cash flows from operations for the years ended March 31, 2021 and 2020, current assets as at March 31, 2021 and 2020, and net assets as at April 1 and March 31 for both the 2021 and 2020 years. Our audit opinion on the financial statements for the year ended March 31, 2021 was modified accordingly because of the possible effects of this limitation in scope.

As discussed in Note 3 to the financial statements, Alzheimer Society of Dufferin County expenses capital asset purchases which constitutes a departure from Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations. This is a result of a decision taken by management to comply with the reporting requirements of the funding agency. As a result, we were unable to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to tangible capital assets, amortization, excess of revenue over expenses and net assets. Our audit opinion on the financial statements for the year ended March 31, 2021 was modified accordingly because of the possible effects of this limitation in scope.

We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements* section of our report. We are independent of the organization in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in Canada, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our qualified audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the organization's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the organization or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the organization's financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the organization's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.

- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the organization's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the organization to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Nature and Purpose	
of Organization	Alzheimer Society of Dufferin County (the "organization") is a non-profit organization incorporated without share capital under the laws of Ontario. The objectives of the organization are to improve the quality of life of persons afflicted with Alzheimer disease; to establish and maintain, deliver and co-ordinate support and education programs for persons affected by Alzheimer disease; to promote public awareness and knowledge as well as to encourage support for research. It is a registered charity and, as such, is exempt from income tax and may issue income tax receipts to donors.
Basis of Accounting	These financial statements have been prepared using Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.
Financial Instruments	Financial instruments are recorded at fair value at initial recognition.
	In subsequent periods, any bonds and guaranteed investment certificates are designated to be in the fair value category, with any change in fair value reported in income. All other financial instruments are reported at cost or amortized cost less impairment. Transaction costs on the acquisition, sale or issue of financial instruments are expensed for those items measured at fair value and charged to the financial instrument for those measured at amortized cost.
	Financial assets are tested for impairment when indicators of impairment exist. When a significant change in the expected timing or amount of the future cash flows of the financial asset is identified, the carrying amount of the financial asset is reduced and the amount of the write-down is recognized in net income. A previously recognized impairment loss may be reversed to the extent of the improvement.
Capital Assets	Capital assets are not recorded on the balance sheet. Capital asset purchases in the year are recorded as expenses in the statement of operations.

- 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)
- Revenue Recognition Alzheimer Society of Dufferin County follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue of the unrestricted fund in the period received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured. Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Revenues (donations, sponsorships) received for events/funding in advance of the event date or the related expenditure are deferred and recognized when the event happens.
- **Contributed Services** Because of the difficulty of determining their fair value, contributed services are not recognized in the financial statements.

6. Commitment

The organization has a lease with respect to its building, which expires March 2024. The minimum lease payments for 2022, 2023 and 2024 are \$31,119, \$32,628 and \$34,137 respectively.

7. Economic Dependence

The organization is economically dependent on the grants it receives from the government.

8. Financial Instrument Risk

Credit Risk

Credit risk is the risk that one party to a financial instrument will cause a financial loss for the other party by failing to discharge an obligation. Credit risk is the risk that the counterparty to the transaction will not pay. The majority of the organization's receivables are from government sources and the organization works to ensure that amounts that qualify for the HST rebate are correctly accounted for. This risk has not changed from the previous year.

Liquidity Risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the organization encounters difficulty in meeting its obligations associated with financial liabilities. Liquidity risk includes the risk that, as a result of operational liquidity requirements, the organization will not have sufficient funds to settle a transaction on the due date; will be forced to sell financial assets at a value, which is less than what they are worth; or may be unable to settle or recover a financial asset. Liquidity risk arises from accounts payable and accrued liabilities and program funding payable. This risk has not changed from the previous year.

9. Subsequent Event

As the impacts of COVID-19 continue, there could be further impact on the organization, its funders and donors. Management is actively monitoring the affect on its financial condition, liquidity, operations, suppliers, industry, and workforce. As a result, management anticipates a temporary decline in donation revenue and has postponed a number of its fundraisers. Given the daily evolution of the COVID-19 out break and the global responses to curb its spread, the organization is not able to fully estimate the effects of the COVID-19 outbreak on its results of operations, financial condition, or liquidity at this time.
