Message from the ASNR President & CEO



Four decades ago in 1984, a group of caregivers came together at the old library in Niagara Falls to share their experiences caring for a loved one with Alzheimer's disease. These supportive gatherings led to the establishment of the Alzheimer Society of Niagara Region.

Today, despite the growing prevalence of dementia and the economic strain on our social and healthcare systems, our Society is recognized for taking proactive steps in providing specialized dementia care that enhances community capacity.

Change doesn't come without challenges and hard work. As you will read in our Annual Report, we are extremely proud of the accomplishments during the 2023-24 fiscal year. People, passion, commitment, and partnerships are at the heart of our story.

Our sincere thanks go out to Grantham Lions Hall and Trillium United Church for hosting our client programs at their facilities as we continue to experience reduced parking due to the rebuilding of Linhaven Home.

One of our major achievements this past year was receiving accreditation from the Canadian Centre for Accreditation. Our site visit occurred in early February, and we successfully obtained approval in early April after dedicating almost two years to refining our policies and enhancing our processes.

In May 2023, the Alzheimer Societies in Ontario Health West were invited to submit proposals to embed our staff in emergency room departments. Our Dementia Resource Consultant (DRC) began at Niagara Health Welland site on January 9th. At March 31st, 42% of individuals seen by the DRC were not admitted to the hospital. Instead, they were provided with support in the community to prevent any returns to the emergency room. This rate of hospitalization diversion has a significant impact on alternate level of care (ALC) rates and healthcare costs.

We successfully incorporated respite hours into our new programs and lobbied for additional hours in our regular programs to alleviate waitlist pressures. The High Intensity Supports at Home (HISH) program effectively prevented high-risk individuals from being hospitalized while awaiting admission to Long Term Care.

We secured funding for two new initiatives. Firstly, a Ministry of Seniors Accessibility Grant funded a Meaningful Visit Program. This consisted of an in-home recreational program to connect persons living with dementia to a customized meaningful activity plan in partnership with Niagara College Recreation students.

Secondly, through the New Horizons program, funding was obtained for a Community Talks Series. This series offered monthly opportunities for individuals living with dementia and their care partners to participate in a wide range of engaging topics chosen by our Advisory Group. The grand finale was a collaboration between the Performing Arts Center and the Canadian National School of Ballet, featuring the exclusive screening of "Dancer not Dementia" and an engaging interactive dance demonstration.

Our Society continues to be an active contributor to the Niagara Ontario Health Team (NOHT-ESON), collaborating with 46 other healthcare organizations to drive positive change in our community. We are proud to lead the Dementia Care Working Group, uniting 14 organizations and two dedicated caregiver representatives. Together, we are committed to enhancing the health and wellbeing of individuals living with dementia and their care partners.

Working alongside passionate and dedicated individuals who share our commitment to our mission, vision, and values is a true privilege. The guidance and expertise of our Board of Directors, partners, volunteers, and staff are essential to achieving greatness. We express our heartfelt gratitude to all of them for their unselfish dedication.

We also extend our sincere gratitude to the thousands of brave caregivers who provide unwavering support to individuals living with dementia.

As dementia prevalence rapidly increases in Ontario, we will persist as a strong advocate for this population and push for change.







Wayne and Barbara Shillington - Client Story



Wayne and his wife Barbara have been involved with the Alzheimer Society since September 2022. Born in Thunder Bay, Ontario, Wayne moved to the Niagara Region in 1959 and has lived there since. He met Barbara square dancing when he was 39, and they have been married for 28 years. Both have children from previous marriages: Wayne has a son and a daughter, and Barbara has two sons and a daughter. Together, they have nine grandchildren.

Wayne worked as a welder fitter and occasionally ran CNC machinery at the Port Weller Dry Docks for thirty years, then spent eight years at Toronto Iron Works. He retired in 2015, a few years after Barbara. In his free time, Wayne enjoys gardening and day trips with Barbara to places like St. Jacobs, Dunnville, and Caledonia. They also enjoy armchair traveling through YouTube, exploring National Parks and hikes across the US and Canada.

Wayne first connected with the Alzheimer Society when a counsellor suggested he get a cognitive assessment. While waiting for the assessment from September 2022 to November 2023, Wayne attended various programs, including Qi Gong exercise classes over Zoom, "Learning the ROPES," "Minds in Motion," and several webinars. These programs helped him learn more about living with cognitive impairment and dementia, exercise, be social, and meet new people. In July 2023, he joined the Advisory Committee, finding it rewarding to share his thoughts on program improvements.

In November 2023, Wayne was diagnosed with mild cognitive impairment after his assessment. He was advised to exercise daily, lose weight, and socialize. Wayne's participation in Qi Gong classes for seventeen months has improved his range of motion and balance. He believes that addressing cognitive changes early can slow or even reverse them. Programs like "Learning the ROPES" and "Beyond Words" have helped him normalize conversations about cognitive change, learn coping strategies, and adjust his self-image. Wayne emphasizes the importance of early intervention in managing cognitive health.

Message from the ASNF Chair & CEO

The Alzheimer Society of the Niagara Region relies on the Foundation's efforts to fund the delivery of essential programs and services. We are very proud of all our accomplishments, as you will read in this Annual Report. As we reflect back on another incredible year, the Foundation raised an amazing \$885,881 through our events, donations and planned gifts.

Program sponsorship is crucial to offering unfunded programs and services to our clients at no cost. We extend our heartfelt gratitude to Court Holdings for their generous \$10,000 contribution to the Minds in Motion Program. This program plays an essential role in providing physical and mental stimulation for individuals with early to mid-stage dementia and their care partners.

We have continued to utilize the funds set up by the Robert Bell & Gladys May Bell Memorial Foundation for the Society's Incontinence and Transportation Programs. This year, we withdrew \$18,500 as we also used bingo funds for taxi vouchers.

Thanks to the support from the Ontario Trillium Foundation Resilient Communities Fund, we hired a Development Officer, who has implemented innovative and effective fundraising strategies to align with evolving industry trends. We successfully executed a year-end direct mailing campaign that not only raised \$20,296 but also brought in new donors. Additionally, these grant funds enabled us to create impactful promotional materials for the Walk for Alzheimer's, significantly boosting awareness and increasing walker participation. Several care facilities also organized walks for their residents on their own premises. As a result, the Walk in May 2023 raised an impressive \$225,260 marking it as the most successful fundraising event to date.

The Peter Saracino Alzheimer Golf Classic, held in September at Legends on the Niagara, raised a net profit of \$57,465. We are immensely grateful for the generous support from our sponsors, including our title sponsor, WMKL Chartered Professional Accountant and Business Advisors, Cooper Wealth Management, and Portage Mutual Insurance.

We will continue to educate individuals regarding the importance of making a Will and the ways in which a gift to a charity can reduce the tax burden on estates without reducing what is left for the beneficiaries. We are incredibly grateful to individuals who recognize that their legacy will continue to help others in perpetuity. This year, we received \$250,379 in bequests, including two significant gifts from a long-term volunteer and a grateful family.

We firmly believe that meaningful change is driven by people, strong relationships and the expertise to overcome challenges. We are consistently inspired and humbled by the unwavering commitment of our Board, staff, volunteers, and partners. Their dedication is the cornerstone of our success. Without them, we would not be able to meet our financial commitments to the Alzheimer Society.
