You Are What You Eat

Japanese *ohagi* can be enjoyed as a snack or as a dessert. The simplest *ohagi* are balls of sweet rice paste surrounded by a layer of sweet anko bean paste. Bean paste for dessert? A crucial ingredient for many Japanese desserts, anko paste is made from red adzuki beans mixed with sugar. Some cooks invert the ingredients of the balls, with the bean paste on the inside and the rice on the outside. The desserts are then rolled in soy flour or sesame seeds. *Ohagi* is traditionally eaten during the Buddhist celebration of *Ohigan*.
