CONTACT YOUR FAMILY DOCTOR OR NURSE PRACTITIONER TO PREVENT A URINARY TRACT INFECTION






SIGNS AND SYMPTOMS OF UTIS MAY INCLUDE:

- Pain or burning when peeing
- Difficulty peeing
- Pee more often than usual
- Sometimes there may be blood in pee
- Side, belly or back pain
- Fever higher than 38C
- · A change in behaviour



WHAT ARE NOT SIGNS OF A URINARY TRACT INFECTION?

- Any one of the signs by itself does not mean someone has a UTI
- Becoming disoriented
- Smelly or cloudy pee does not mean someone has a UTI
- Some foods and medications may cause changes in how pee looks or smells



IN NON-EMERGENCY SITUATIONS, CONTACT YOUR FAMILY DOCTOR OR NURSE PRACTITIONER.

- Recall the date of last UTI
- Record frequency of urination
- Your family doctor or nurse practitioner may ask for a pee sample to send to a laboratory for testing
- Toilet hat specimen collectors are available from a pharmacy for ease in providing pee samples
- The family doctor or nurse practitioner may wait for the results of the pee sample before a treatment is decided





WHENEVER POSSIBLE CONTACT YOUR FAMILY DOCTOR AS YOUR FIRST POINT OF ACCESS FOR CARE. OTHER HEALTH CARE OPTIONS
