## Happy Birthday!

Alfred Mosher Butts (1899–1993) was an American architect who was born in Poughkeepsie, New York. Butts is best known for inventing the game of Scrabble. In the 1930s, he decided to create a winning board

game that combined both skill and luck, utilizing a player's prowess with words as well as the power of chance when pulling letter tiles. Originally



titled Lexiko and Criss Cross Words, Scrabble was first trademarked in 1948 and has since sold more than 150 million sets. Butts was also an artist. Some of his drawings are housed in the Metropolitan Museum of Art.

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**Today is** Scrabble Day. The game was invented by architect Alfred Mosher Butts in 1933. Butts built each game individually in his garage, but in 1957, when Macy's placed a large order, he had to sell it to a large manufacturer.

### Set the Record Straight

The Biblical tale of David slaying the giant Goliath is often summoned as a metaphor for any underdog defeating a giant. But some historians now argue that Goliath was not a 20-foot giant. Ancient texts describe Goliath as "four cubits and a span," exactly the same size as the width of the protective gate outside Goliath's hometown of Gath. Some historians contend that he was simply being compared metaphorically to the gateway as a defender of the town. Others, using ancient measurements for cubits and spans, measure Goliath as six feet and nine inches tall.
