1612 – English explorer Thomas Button sailed into Hudson Bay and discovered the Nelson River. He also explored what became the New North Wales and New South Wales regions of today’s Manitoba.

1910 – U.S. President William Howard Taft began a sports tradition by throwing out the first baseball of the season at an American League game between Washington and Philadelphia.

Anne Sullivan (1866–1936) was born to Irish immigrants in Massachusetts. At age five, she developed eye infections that led to partial blindness. Her mother died while she was a child, and she was sent to an orphanage.



Eventually, Sullivan convinced an orphanage inspector to send her to Boston to the Perkins School for the Blind. Her first job was tutoring Helen Keller, a challenge she rose to famously. Eventually, Keller also went to the Perkins School. The two were lifelong friends. Their ashes are interred next to each other in the Washington National Cathedral.



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Today is Perfume Day. The French perfumer Jean Carles is known as the Beethoven of perfume. Carles used his nose to build famous perfumes by scent and continued to create perfumes even after losing his sense of smell later in life.

Eye in the Sky

Last December 21, the planets Jupiter and Saturn came together in the night sky in a rare event known as the “Great Conjunction,” a phenomenon that only happens every 800 years. The two planets ended up looking like a massive star. This event has led some astronomers to speculate that the same type of occurrence was the “Star of Bethlehem” mentioned in the Bible.
