1298 – English troops used longbows for the first time, defeating the Scottish army at the Battle of Falkirk. The longbow has been called the machine gun of the Middle Ages. The deadly contraption had a long range and could fire six arrows a minute.

**1933** – Caterina Jarboro became the first black prima donna of an opera company. The singer performed *Aida* at the Hippodrome in New York.

**1959** – The first Canadian jazz festival opened in Toronto, featuring Oscar Peterson, Maynard Ferguson, and special guest Louis Armstrong.

Amy Vanderbilt (1908–1974) was an authority on manners who published the best-selling book *Amy Vanderbilt's Complete Book of Etiquette* in 1952. An updated

edition is still in circulation today and is considered a standard of etiquette writing. From 1954 to 1960, Vanderbilt hosted the television



program *It's in Good Taste*. She then hosted the radio program *The Right Thing to Do* from 1960 to 1962. Her 1961 *Amy Vanderbilt's Complete Cookbook* was illustrated by Andy Warhol.

Cold shoulder

If you're angry at someone, you might want to give them the cold *shoulder* to make them feel unwelcome. Linguists believe this phrase originated as a polite way to tell dinner guests that it was time to leave. After a feast, hosts would signal the revelry was over by giving away slices of cold meat cut from the shoulder of beef or mutton. The expression might be a mistranslation of a Latin phrase that included the word *umerus*, which means *back*, but was translated as *shoulder*.
