1983 – Air Canada Flight 143, since nicknamed the “Gimli Glider,” ran out of fuel at 41,000 feet. The crew managed to glide the aircraft safely to an abandoned airbase at Gimli, Manitoba. It was later revealed that the fuel tanks had not been filled fully due to a fuel monitoring system glitch and a misunderstanding of the recently adopted metric system.



1996 – NASA announced the discovery of the exoplanet Kepler-452b. It is nicknamed “Earth’s Cousin.” It is bigger than Earth with twice the gravity and is slightly warmer. Vera Rubin (1928–2016) was an



American astronomer from Philadelphia who discovered key principles on galaxy rotation and dark matter. Her influential

work helped confirm the existence of dark matter in space. Rubin was also instrumental in opening up the field of science to women and passionately encouraged women to pursue work in STEM professions. Rubin herself was a testament to her assertion that “There is no problem in science that can be solved by a man that cannot be solved by a woman.” She was a winner of the Gold Medal of the Royal Astronomical Society.

The paper clip has achieved cult status in Norway thanks to inventor Johan Vaaler, who patented his idea for a paper clip in 1899. Unbeknownst to Vaaler, American Samuel B. Fay had already received a patent for his clip invention in 1867, although this clip was meant to attach tickets to fabric. The paperclip we know today, with its double wire loops, was produced in Britain by the Gem Manufacturing Company in the 1870s. This original "gem clip" has been used by office workers for over 100 years.
