SUPPORT - Support groups and opportunities for individual support, including proactive and planned contact at minimum every six months.



Driving and Dementia

From January 2020 to March 2023, the Alzheimer Society of Saskatchewan, with support from SGI and in partnership with Team 16 from the Canadian Consortium on Neurodegeneration in Aging, built a body of evidence around driving cessation and supported the development of the Driving & Dementia Roadmap (DDR.)


Every diagnosis package the Alzheimer Society of Saskatchewan provides First Link clients now includes a copy of the DDR.

Dementia Helpline

Who is the Dementia Helpline for?

Anyone who has questions about dementia can call the Dementia Helpline. I talk to people at all stages of the disease and even those who do not have a diagnosis.

How does someone get connected to Alzheimer Society programs and support groups?

You can refer yourself by calling the Dementia Helpline or our provincial office. You can also have your doctor, healthcare provider, or another community agency that you are working with complete a First Link Direct Referral form on your behalf.

When is the best time to call?

I encourage people to reach out and connect with our community of support any time you need and as things progress - so you don't feel alone, stressed, or overwhelmed.

Supporting Families During End-of-Life Care

Members from our Programs and Services team formed a working group to review and enrich the content of our Care in the Later Stages Learning Series curriculum, which helps participants prepare for advanced stages of dementia and learn more about the process of grief and loss. Incorporating more culturally responsive resources and principles of Dialogue Education were identified as key priorities.

*Dialogue Education is based on the idea that people learn best when they get to talk about and try new ideas and skills, rather than just hear about them.

Growing our Support

First Link® Enhancement Project

First Link[®] is currently undergoing an expansion to ensure the program can continue to improve and grow to meet the needs of all clients who want to work with the Alzheimer Society, and to evaluate the impact of the First Link[®] Program with the intention of generating national, long-term, sustainable funding for the program across the country. New developments within The First Link Enhancement Project include:

Client Wellbeing Indicators – First Link

Coordinators are now completing the new client Risk Indicator Tool during each point of contact with an assessment to determine client emergency preparedness, care partner stress and well-being, and emergency room visits or hospitalizations for the person living with dementia.

The implementation of the Risk Indicator Tool has increased the frequency and number of follow-up calls to clients, while allowing us to connect more regularly and consistently with clients based on their needs.

Demographic Indicators – Through the First Link Enhancement project, new indicators were added to Alzheimer Society databases to enable us to collect more demographic information about each client we work with, including: gender identity, race/ ethnicity, language at birth for the person living with dementia, and sexual orientation. These indicators will help our team identify any gaps in service delivery and opportunities to further tailor our programs, resources, and outreach to be more inclusive of the different cultural and linguistic communities across the province and country.

Primary Health Care Memory Clinics

Primary Health Care Memory Clinics are becoming more prevalent in rural Saskatchewan which enable more individuals and families to access services in one location and receive a diagnosis closer to home. Alzheimer Society of Saskatchewan First Link Coordinators are embedded in every clinic offered by Rural Action Dementia Research (RaDAR) and MINT Memory clinics for additional support and ongoing, planned follow-up.
