Dementia by the numbers

The urgency

- Over 600,000 The number of Canadians living with dementia today
- Over 1.7 million Canadians could be living with dementia in 2050
- Women are more likely to have a diagnosis of dementia. Of the people living with dementia in 2020, just over 61% were women.

The costs

- Currently, 75% of total home care hours are being met by unpaid care partners.
- In 2023 there are over 175,000 unpaid care partners supporting someone living with dementia across Ontario. Collectively, these care partners contribute 4,855,500 hours of unpaid care every week—equivalent to nearly 140,000 full-time jobs.
- By 2050, it is estimated that there will be 444,400 dementia care partners in Ontario who are projected to provide nearly 645 million hours of care per year.
- Unpaid care partners save health care systems across Canada an estimated \$25 billion annually in direct care In 2020, there were an estimated 350,000 unpaid care partners for people living with dementia in Canada who provided 470 million hours of care. This number is equivalent to 235,000 full time jobs. In dollars, the care provided by these unpaid care partners translates into more than \$7.3 billion in health system savings.

The stigma

- 56% of Canadians are concerned about being affected by Alzheimer's disease.4,7
- 46% of Canadians admit they would feel ashamed or embarrassed if that they had dementia.4
- 87% of caregivers wish that more people understood the realities of caring for someone with dementia.4

<u>The progress</u>

- More than \$64 million invested to date in research through the Alzheimer Society Research Program.
- 37,000+ Canadians participated in the 2019 IG Wealth Management Walk for Alzheimer's, raising a record \$6.2 million that will fund programs and services for people living with dementia across Canada.





The coordinated plan highlights both local and provincial initiatives to improve our outreach as a collective group as well as to enhance local partnerships in our regions.




Strategic Directions 2022-2027

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2022-2023 was another very challenging year ... with more success than the prior year.



Despite the pandemic we still received support from the Timmins Charity Bingo Association in the amount of \$28115!!!


